The Rector will give an address on Personal Religion at the 4:30 service this afternoon.

St. Peter's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary will hold its regular meeting tomorrow at 10 o'clock in the Parish House. Luncheon will be served at 1 o'clock.

Tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock, a beautiful pageant, under the auspices of the United Offering, entitled "The Awaiting World," will be given for the benefit of the women of the Parish. There will be 38 characters represented, and the scenes and costumes will be most attractive. The pageant itself is under the direction of Mrs. Chas. J. Miller, who has spared no pains in its preparation. At the conclusion of the pageant, Tea will be served in the Parish House, making the day one altogether given over to our Branch of the Auxiliary. Every woman in this Parish is urged by the Rector to be present.

The Annual Parish Meeting was held last Monday evening at 8 o'clock in the Parish House, and a wonderful meeting it was. The excellent reports from every department of the Church's work created great enthusiasm. One thing, however, which was somewhat of an innovation was the admirable address made by Mr. Peter Dowling, one of the Committee of Epiphany Chapel. Mr. Dowling spoke of the needs of the Chapel, and especially of the new hardwood floor, which is not only desideratum, but a necessity. His address called forth tremendous applause, and brought Epiphany nearer to the hearts and mind of St. Peter's Congregation than ever before. The project of securing this new floor was given great impetus by voluntary pledges, and the estimate will be secured at once and the work carried out.

It was with deep regret that the Rector announced the inability of Mr. Hudson E. Bridge to serve as Vestryman, for everyone realizes what splendid work Mr. Bridge has done for St. Peter's during the many years in which he has been actively associated here. Mr. Lynton T. Block was elected to fill the vacancy, all the other Vestrymen being re-elected.

St. Peter's Parish did not meet its full quota for the Nation-Wide Campaign, much to our regret, but there are many reasons why this is so. In the first place, business conditions, especially during the last few months, have not been encouraging, and many persons found themselves unable to contribute as generously as no doubt they will be able to do this coming year. In the second place, a number of people in the Parish did not seem to understand the gravity of the situation which confronts the General Church, and we feel sure that with a campaign of education conducted in a quiet, orderly fashion, every member of this Congregation will take real pride in being enrolled as a contributor to the work of the General Church this coming year. Mr. Price, as Chairman of the Parish Committee, has done most excellent work in season and out of season, and the Rector and Vestry wish to record their grateful appreciation of the fact. Mr. John G. Hoyt very graciously offered to assist Mr. Price and the Committee in making its final drive during the last two weeks of December, and too much cannot be said of the efficient way in which he assisted in increasing the amount contributed for the 1920 quota. St. Peters needs a more efficient organization, and the Rector feels sure that under the direction of such able men as we have in the Parish great things can be accomplished.

Next Sunday morning, the Rev. Henry Russell Talbot, Canon of the Washington Cathedral, will be the special preacher at the 11 o'clock service, and it is earnestly hoped that a very large congregation will be present.
