Next Sunday, May 1st, is the twenty-first anniversary of the Rector's Ordination to the Priesthood, and he earnestly invites every member of this Parish to be present at one or both of the services, to share with him at the Holy Communion his sense of privilege in being permitted to minister thus to the people of God in His sanctuary.

Last Tuesday evening St. Peter's Chapter of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew had a special meeting, at which the principal speaker was Mr. Walter MacPherson, one of the Field Secretaries of the National Association. The clear, clean-cut way in which Mr. MacPherson presented the opportunities and responsibilities of the men of the Church made a deep and lasting impression upon every man present. Beginning next month, the Rector, in conjunction with the Brotherhood, will hold a Corporate Communion Service for the men of the Parish on the third Sunday of the month at the 7:30 service. The Brotherhood has also undertaken the ushering and work of hospitality at all the afternoon services, and a committee of two will be present each Sunday morning to greet and welcome young men who come to St. Peter's, and who may be strangers in the city.

On last Thursday morning at 10 o'clock there was a Corporate Communion service for the members of the Council of the Church Service League, and also for St. Mary's Guild. It is difficult to estimate the spiritual value of these services, but everyone present felt a new and stirring impetus was given to the work of the Parish, as the meeting of the Council of the Church Service League held immediately after the services attested. A similar service and business meeting will be held on the third Thursday of each month.

The bazaar which was given on April 13th by the ladies of St. Peter's Guild was not only a great financial success, but manifested the splendid spirit of co-operation in the Guild than which nothing is more needed in the life and work of the Church. For many years this splendid organization of fine, self-sacrificing women has been a constant source of inspiration and helpfulness in building up and maintaining the work of this Church, and the Rector wishes to express to the officers and chairmen of the several committees of St. Peter's Guild his deep appreciation of their work and fine spirit of loyalty.
