## Announcements.

The meeting of the Provincial Synod held in St. Peter's Church this week proved to be a great inspiration, not only to the delegates, but to all who attended.

The Provincial Council, which corresponds to the Presiding Bishop and Council in this Province met in the Parish House on Tuesday, and all business pertaining to the Synod was thoroughly discussed, thus enabling the Synod to deal expeditiously with all the problems confronting them, demonstrating beyond a doubt the necessity of organization for the dispatch of the Church's business.

The opening service of the Synod was held in St. Peter's Church, Wednesday morning, October 19, at 9:30 o'clock. Bishop Tuttle was the celebrant, and Bishop Thurston of Oklahoma, the Preacher. The service was one of the most beautiful ever held in this church, and the Rector extends to Mr. Galloway and the members of St. Peter's Choir, his deep and grateful appreciation of the exquisite music, pronounced by everyone who heard it, the best that has ever been rendered on any similar occasion. Bishop Thurston's sermon was masterful to a degree. He dealt unflinchingly with problems confronting the Church and offered wholesome remedies. A touching portion of the sermon was his delicate reference to the more than twenty-five years of leadership of our own dear Mrs. Simmons, as President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Missouri. The Bishop also dealt most ably with the alarming situation confronting the Church in the lack of candidates for the Ministry, and throughout the entire discourse there was a note of optimism which inspired all his hearers.

On Wednesday evening a Mass Meeting was held in the Church at which two notable addresses were made by Mr. James H. Pershing of Denver, and Dr. John W. Wood, Executive Secretary of the Department of Missions. Mr. Pershing dealt with the problem of finance in a most refreshing and stimulating way, and as a member of the Presiding Bishop and Council, outlined a splendid program for this most necessary work of the Church. Dr. Wood, in speaking to the subject, "A Century of Endeavor," gave an inspiring address on the work of the Church and her wonderful development.

It is not possible to speak in detail of all the splendid sessions of the Synod, but one must not omit mention of the Missionary Plays given at the Artists' Guild on Thursday evening.

The splendid program of the entire Synod was arranged by our own Bishop Johnson, and every detail was carried out with precision and smoothness, and every delegate felt that the King's business had been placed above everything else.

Conspicuous among the events of the week were the meetings of the women of the Province in which every phase of women's work in the Church was most ably presented and discussed.

The Rector and Synod itself, wish to extend to the ladies of St. Peter's and St. Mary's Guilds, the deepest appreciation for the bountiful and beautifully appointed luncheons that were served during the meeting of the Synod, a notable illustration of the fact is that St. Peter's parish is indeed one large family.
