3. Prelude and Fugue on the Name "Bach"...FRANZ LISZT The theme of this composition consists of the tones B flat, A, C, B, which in German nomenclature are B, A, C, H. Of the many compositions upon this well-known theme, this, by Liszt, is the most brilliant and dramatic. The work is full of startling contrasts, bravura passages alternating with mysterious pianissimos. It may be considered a concert fantasia rather than a fugue, for after the "exposition" of his theme, Liszt is no longer bound by the orderly Fugue form. (S. A. B.)

- 1. Prelude and Fugue in A MinorBACH This work was probably written during the Weimar period when Bach was court organist, though it was undoubtedly revised later at Leipzig where he wrote his greatest organ compositions. The masterly development of the fugue places it on a plane with the finest examples of Bach's latest works.
- CHORALE PRELUDE, "HERZLICH THUT MICH VERLANGEN," ("My Heart Is Filled with Longing")BACH Many of Bach's finest inspirations are to be found in his masterly treatment of the Lutheran Chorales. The possibilities of a brief statement of the tune, with slight decoration, are well shown in this exquisite little piece. Its appeal depends on several factors—the perfect harmonization, the interest of the accompanying parts, and the broken utterance obviously evoked by the word "longing."
- 3. Canon in B MinorSCHUMANN In 1845, Schumann became interested in a pedal-piano which was installed in the Leipzig Conservatory and wrote several pieces for it, among which this Canon is a graceful and charming example.
- 4. Clair de LuneKARG-ELERT Karg-Elert is a German of extreme modern tendencies. That he is a master of producing atmosphere is demonstrated by this very colorful and realistic tone-picture.
