\$ As the dedicatory inauguration of the splendld new organ at the First presinterian church, the organ recital given last evening by Charles Galloway of St. Louis, had, a distinct impertance other than musical, it being the first opportunity of hearing the veice of the instrument. As it proved, musically, it had an interest that did not need this other claim to establish g as noteworthy.
