

ORGAN RECITAL AT WASHINGTON U

Hollins' Berceuse on the Program This Afternoon.

The first organ recital of the season at Washington University given by Charles Galloway will take place in Graham Memorial Chapel today, from 3 to 4 p. m. The program includes the Berceuse, or lullaby, by Alfred Hollins, the famous blind organist of St. George's Free Church, in Edinburgh. The accompaniment suggests the motion of the cradle, while the melody typifies the song of the mother.

The other selections will include the Epithalamium, or Wedding Hymn, by

Huntington Woodman; the serious, sonorous and dignified Toccata and Fugue by Polibio Fumagalli, the famous organist and teacher of Milan; the Sonata No. 1 in C sharp minor, op. 5, from Basil Harwood, the noted composer of choral works, church music and organ pieces. Harwood was formerly organist of Ely Cathedral and Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford. The recitals are given every month and are free to the public.
